## Does Your Department Have a Safety Action Plan?

Each department must have a safety action plan. The plan must not only identify common hazards, but also develop solutions and account for timely follow-up on actions to ensure hazards are addressed. Our National Workplace Safety Strategy requires this.

If you aren't sure your department has a plan, ask your manager.

If there is no plan, create a unit-based team project using SMART goals (Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Relevant, Time-bound) to address your unique department challenges. Encourage your co-workers to talk about their safety concerns. Ask what solutions they have for resolving them.
