SPEAK UP FOR SAFETY



SEE SOMETHING, SAY SOMETHING

Our Kaiser Permanente members, patients and teammates count on us to speak up when we see a health or safety risk.



I should say something or someone might get hurt.

Stopping for Safety is a way for an individual to stop the work of a team when a major risk is perceived — such as an injury or illness to staff or patients.

This month ask your unit-based team if a Safety Stop or other procedure is in place in your department.

» IF YES...

Do you use it? Are there barriers to calling a Safety Stop?

» IF NO...

What do you need to ensure a policy is created and your team is trained?



KEY TIP: Create a UBT project to address the issues identified by any safety stop that is called.



REGIONALLY SPEAKING

- 1. Ask your manager or a facility or regional safety leader if your region uses a phrase other than "Stopping for Safety."
- 2. Ask your UBT members and co-workers if they are familiar with the phrase "Stopping for Safety." If there is another term in use, share that with them.
- 3. If there is no common phrase consider using "Safety Stop," which is used by Workplace Safety in many regions.
